It is without hesitation that I write a recommendation letter for Ryan Arciero. At the same time, when I formed the groups where the students would work with others with whom they were not familiar, Ryan kept an open mind to others' ideas, asked questions to constructively challenge their thinking, and sincerely complimented others for the important contributions they had made to group goals. His ability to learn from his peers as well as to provide valuable contributions himself compels me to believe that Ryan would be an excellent addition to any learning community.

In conclusion, his drive to succeed and his desire to work with others are among the many reasons that I believe Ryan Arciero would be a welcome addition to any school community. Although he performed exceptionally well in my class, what he demonstrated to me was far more important: Ryan has a sincere desire to challenge his thinking, learn from his experiences, and grow as a professional.
